Democracy Pupils learn how they can influence decision- making through debates, persuasive writing, or posters. They understand why the voting system is fair. We promote respect for public institutions and services and for human rights and fundamental freedoms. They will know that laws are in place to protect the oceans and the sea life. They will identify laws about littering. They learn about the laws of the Indigenous people in South America, which secure access to the lands and resources essential to their way of life, and maintain their distinct cultural identities.
